



	The extractive sector significantly contributes to tax revenue collected in Africa; however, research indicates that IFFs are rampant in the extractive industry, with USD 40 Billion lost annually. In light of the increased demand for Africa's transition minerals as the continent navigates the climate crisis, this session will focus on resource taxation and how to curb IFFs, climate financing and what a just energy transition means for Africa within the context of ongoing discussions to reform the international financial architecture.  Experts from different sectors based on future trends and opportunities will explore policy options and solutions for resource taxation, climate financing, and Africa's just energy transition. Discussions and recommendations from this session will contribute to shaping ongoing advocacy for urgently reforming the current international financial architecture.

	Various studies have shown that IFFs out of the continent are on the rise. In 2015, the Report of the High-Level Panel on Illicit Financial Flows from Africa indicated that Africa was losing US50 billion a year. In 2020, UNCTAD estimated that IFFs were now at an estimated at USD 89 billion. The session will focus on recent data collected on trade mispricing between trading partners and illustrate the need for policy intervention and out-of-the-box thinking.
